Apostrophe for possession



Two jobs of an apostrophe:

- 1. Join two words and contract to make one word: should not \rightarrow shouldn't
- 2. To show possession

Last time you looked at both! Today you are going to focus on apostrophes for possession.

Activity 1:

Can you add the apostrophes for possession? E.g Johns cat needs to go the dentist.

- 2. The teachers book has gone missing.
- 3. The mans car broke down.
- 4. The game in the playground was Amelias idea.
- 5. Daniels picture was beautiful because he had painted carefully.

Activity 2

Rewrite the sentence using the apostrophe showing <u>what</u> belongs to <u>who.</u> (You can add extra information if you want to make it more exciting).

e.g The <u>blue rucksack</u> belongs to <u>Emma</u>. <u>Emma's rucksack is blue. She likes it because it matches her school</u> <u>uniform so she looks smart.</u>

1. The pretty, pink shed belongs to Sharon.

2. The smart, shiny watch belongs to Dave.

3. The sneaky, quiet cat belongs to Auntie Jane.

Activity 3

Find 3 objects in your house and write 3 sentences describing who they belong to. (See if you can use a conjunction and adjectives!)

E.g. Miss Leggett's pencil case is full of new and exciting pens because she loves drawing colourful pictures.
