Take 6 to 8 plastic cups and turn them upside down. place a small number of objects such as buttons, beads or matchsticks underneath each cup. Make sure that the amount of objects varies so one cup might have 4 buttons and another only 2. Now stick a tricky word card on top of the cup and you are ready to play. Take turns with your child to choose a tricky word, read it and collect the buttons from underneath. The winner is the person with the most buttons.

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Secret Word Game

Write out a tricky word in large letters. This could be done outside in chalk or on a sheet of paper. Cover over some of the letters using buttons, plasticine or play dough. Ask your child to guess the word. If your child is not sure of the tricky word, remove one of the buttons and try again.

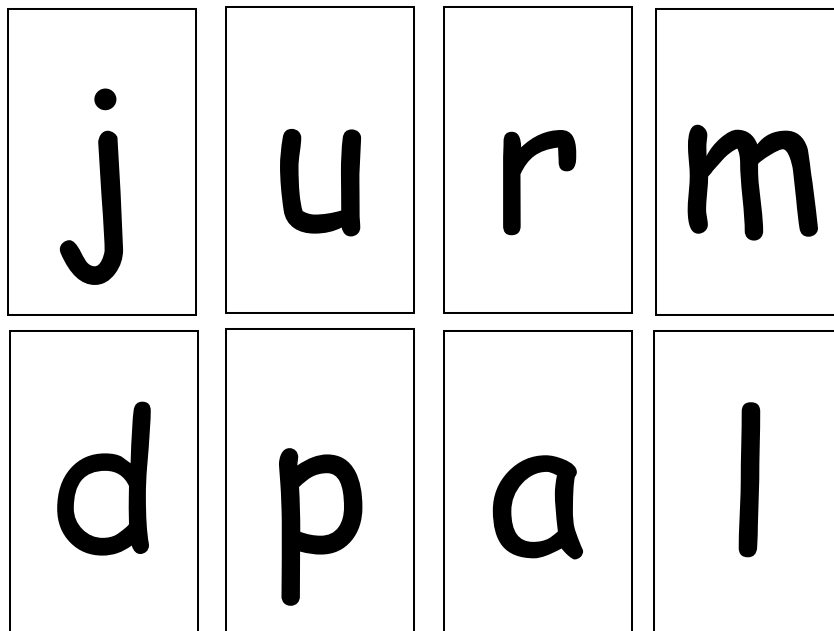
