Activity 2 – Read the sentences below and underline words with our two focus sounds. Draw a picture to show you have understood.


I saw a monster last night.

Activity 3 - Circle the correct spelling. Which one looks right?






Activity 5- anagrams.


Can you and your child unscramble the words and re-write them with the correct spelling using the alternative spellings we have looked at this week?
