Vocabulary Questions with Vocabulary Victor

Vocabulary Victor will help you to look at how authors and poets have chosen to use certain words and phrases.





Retrieval Questions with Rex Retriever

Rex Retriever will help you to go into a text and retrieve the facts.

Discuss what type of book this is. Do they think it is non-fiction or fiction? Why? Discuss the features of non-fiction and find them in the book together.

Look at the front cover -

- What does the word 'wild' mean? Can you think of another word to describe the weather? E.g. fierce, dangerous etc.
- Have a think about what type of weather it is today. Is the weather the same as it is on the front cover?

Thunderstorms

- What can you see before a thunderstorm?
- Hailstones are always big. Is this statement true or false? Use the information from the book to help you.
- How long can a flash of lightning be between the cloud and ground?

Hurricanes

- What does the word hurricane mean? Look it up in the glossary.
- Where do hurricanes form?
- What is the centre of a hurricane called? Why do you think it might be called this?

Tornadoes

- How does a tornado form?
- How loud if a tornado? What is it compared to in the book?

Extra ideas:

- Can you make a poster about one of your favourite parts of the book? You could for example, choose hurricanes and draw a picture, label with information and facts.
- Can you keep a record of the different weather we have here in England? You could record with your family what type of weather it is and the temperature each day.
- Can you do some extra research about wild weather? You could use the internet to find more information and write your own fact file.
