Task - Looking at toys of the past and present

Task - Astronauts

Apollo 11 happened in 1969 and Neil Armstrong was the first man to step onto the moon. Can you remember the names of the other two astronauts who took part in the Apollo 11 space mission with Neil? Would you like to be an astronaut? Why? Have a go at designing your very own space suit if you were an astronaut.

Task - Victorian Schools

The Victorians era took place from 1837 to 1901. The reigning monarch was Queen Victoria and she had a husband called Prince Albert. Using the internet, have a look at a picture of a Victorian school. Does it look like our school? What is similar? What is different? Would you like to be a child who attends a Victorian school?
